#### Vince Valade Awards

Vince began this award program in 1995 to allow that minerals collected by members might be judged and recognized to all members. The program evolved over the years to include minerals, micromounts, lapidary, jewelry and best overall. The problem with any program of complexity is to set it up for anyone to manage. This year the categories were simplified to four. Altogether there were 9 submissions by 8 members.

## **BERYL-Variety Aqua Marine, from Palermo mines.**

This winning beryl specimen was discovered by **Angela Pratt** after an old dump was turned over by an excavator. It was certainly an unexpected find after spending 6 hours poking around in the spoils. The next day the Palermo crew went looking for the cast of this mineral, and they found it. The specimen exceeds 6 inches in length.

A submission by Terry Crowell from Palermo of vivianite, a phosphate mineral, recovered from a new site at the mine.

#### **MESOLITE-from Arizona**

This winning mesolite specimen was found by **Robert (Bob) Wilken** who worked 2 hours in a secret New Mexico site. Bob says that mesolite is a fragile member of the zeolite group, and forms almost exclusively in delicate, needle–like crystal habits. www.minerals.net

Other honorable submissions:

- 1. Petrified wood found in Arizona by Dawn Quirk.
- 2. Azurite found by Chris Buerkle in Arizona.
- 3. A very rare blue beryl-variety aquamarine-found in an Arizona pegmatite by Bob York.

The lapidary categories includes all types of minerals that are cut, faceted, carved and polished by the hand of man to become the central setting in jewelry. The minerals should be of natural origin and not synthetic in any way. This does not preclude that some minerals might be altered by heating, etc. To simplify the ballot and counting, faceted stones are not separated by size.

Other honorable submission:



Come to the meeting to see what happened and what was found.



# **Display Minerals for the January Meeting**

Bring in your specimens from the Alps. Any country that includes the Alps is a candidate. Smoky quartz, fluorite, and fluorapatite are especially characteristic of the Alps.

The engraved granite paving stone the club purchased to help support the Maine Mineral & Gem Museum was engraved in October and holds a prominent place at the entrance to the museum from the parking lot. The shape of the paver is like a faceted stone and is in the center of the area to the left of the entrance as shown above. It was an interesting process. First a stencil is made, applied to the granite (see photo at right) and cemented down with a special cement. Finally the stone is sandblasted but only the letters show up since the material bounces of the stencil material.
