Frederick C. Wilda Mineral and Nature Artist

Fred is a self-taught artist who has made commercial and fine arts his chosen career since 1959. He became a mineral artist in 1998. His watercolor paintings fall into one of two basic categories...specimen or species. A species painting may require more than one specimen to complete the work. He prefers to work from actual specimens, but when necessary he can use photos. Limited edition prints are made from the original watercolors. Many of his originals are commissions from collectors or museums.



Fred has completed a series of over 130 illustrations for reproduction in a book titled "The Pegmatite Mines Known as Palermo", written by Robert W. Whitmore of New Hampshire. His work has also been included in articles in the Extra Lapis English magazine as well as Rocks & Minerals and Rocks & Gems magazines. Fred was honored to be picked as the "Featured Artist" in the 2004 Mineral and Fossil Show in Munich, Germany. His originals and limited editions prints are in many collections throughout the United States and Abroad. Currently selections of his paintings are in the collection of the Gemological Institute of America in Carlsbad, California.

Fred's passion for art is matched by his obsession for minerals. Avid field collectors, he and his fiancée, Helen Rodak, have a very impressive collection. The challenge of illustrating minerals is fueled by the vast amount of subjects available. Fred's answer to this challenge is "The joy of completing a painting is dwarfed by the anticipation of doing another".

His paintings and limited edition prints are displayed at various Mineral Shows including the Connecticut Valley Mineral Club Show, the East Coast Gem, Mineral and Fossil Show held in West Springfield, Mass, and various other New England Shows.

Fred will be talking to us about the Manhan Lead Mines of Easthampton, Massachusetts. The mines were originally opened in the 1600's and have a long history. Mindat lists over 50 species from these mines. Fred has collected this area for many years and is one of the most knowledgeable collectors of the mines and minerals of the area.

Fred will also give a short presentation on the outreach his club Connecticut Valley Mineral Club does in providing mineral kits to schools and others. This information will certainly be a help to the Capital Mineral Club which is beginning an effort in this area.

This will be a very informative talk and would encourage everyone to attend. Minerals of the month will be Wulfenite and in addition the minerals of the Manhan Lead Mines.

Wulfenite

Formula: Pb(MoO₄) (Lead Molybdate)

Crystal System: Tetragonal

Crystal Habit: Thin tabular crystals to sometimes blocky or pyramidal crystals

Color: Orange, yellow, red, gray, brown, olive green, black or combination of these colors rarely colorless

Luster: Adamantine, sub-adamantine, resinous Optical Property: Transparent to opaque

Streak: White Hardness (Mohs): 2.75 – 3 Tenacity: Brittle

Cleavage: Distinct/good Fracture: Sub-Conchoidal to uneven Density: 6.5 - 7.5 g/cm³

Member of: Scheelite Group

Name: Named in Honor of Franz Xavier von Wulfen (1728 – 1805) a Jesuit priest who was a mineralogist and botanist. Wulfen authored a book on the lead ores of Bleiberg, Austria.

Wulfenite is a secondary mineral formed in the oxidized zone of hydrothermal lead deposits. The molybdenum usually is introduced from external sources such as the surrounding rock into which the hydrothermal solutions were introduced. It is commonly associated with cerussite, anglesite, smithsonite, hemimorphite, vanadinite, pyromorphite, mimetite, descloisite and plattnerite. Wulfenite occurs at hundreds of mines throughout the world most notably from Bleiberg, Austria; Mežica, Slovenia Tseumb, Namibia and the Touissit mine in Morocco. Mexico has numerous famous localities including the San Francisco mine in Magdelena, Sonora; at Los Lamentos and Santa Eulaia, Chihuahua and in the Ojuela mine, Mapimi, Durango. In 2006 China joined in with very attractive red to orange wulfenite crystals from the Jianshan Mine, Bayin'gholin Autonomous Prefecture, Xinjiang Autonomous Region. Prior to this find Chinese wulfenites were somewhat mediocre.

In the United States the most famous localities are in Arizona and the list of "classic" wulfenite localities begin with the Red Cloud mine in the Trigo Mountains in La Paz County where the crystals are a deep red color and with some collectors set the standard for the species. Fine crystals came from the Old Yuma mine near Tucson which is now in the Saguaro National Monument which is no longer accessible for collecting. The Glove mine in Santa Cruz County and the Defiance mine in Gleeson, Cochise County are the source of spectacular wulfenite crystal groups. Other locations in Arizona include the Mammoth-St. Anthony mine in Tiger, the Hilltop mine in the Chiricahua Mountains, the Rowley mine in Thebe, the Finch mine in Hayden as well as many other numerous mines. New Mexico's entry is the Stevenson Bennett mine in the Organ Mountains of Doña Ana County.

There are only two locations in the east where wulfenite is commonly found. One is in the Phoenixville Mining District, Schuylkill Township, Chester County, Pennsylvania. Wulfenite there occurs in orange crystals up to 2-5 millimeters. The mines in this area including the Weatley mines, Brookdale mine, Pennypacker mine and others are more famous for the pyromorphite specimens of a vivid green color that were relatively common in this mining district. In the Manhan mines, which are the subject of November's talk, wulfenite occurs in orange crystals up to 5 millimeters. It is particularly attractive when it occurs on green pyromorphite crystals making a striking contrast with their bright orange color.

As an additional note wulfenite does occur in New Hampshire but is extremely rare and in very tiny crystals. The William Wise mine in Westmoreland was the first reported occurrence confirmed by Harvard University in 1994. This specimen was collected by Don Dallaire in 1990 but was with uncleaned quartz specimens for several years until cleaning revealed the wulfenite crystals. In 2008 Gene Bearss collected and identified wulfenite crystals from Mineral Hill in Wakefield. The Madison Lead mine specimen was sight identified. In 2000 Art Smith on a collecting trip with Gene Bearss brought home specimens for investigation under the microscope. In a vug with acicular pyromorphite crystals he observed tiny (<.5millimeters) pyramidal crystals in the vug. A single specimen collected in 2001 by Bob Janules and Vincent Valade had tiny .1 millimeter wulfenite crystals with pyromorphite from the Madison Lead mine. A few other locations have been listed with wulfenite occurring there but there is no information or confirmation at the other sites. Needless to say, wulfenite is quite rare in New Hampshire.

Only **Club members present** at the December meeting are eligible to enter and vote.

COMMENTS

The Creative Lapidary category will be set up by one individual, named in the November newsletter, who should be contacted by the participants prior to the meeting. Voting slips will be provided and the entries marked by number and category. Your "best of show" vote will most likely be a repeat of one of your choices. Winners from each category will receive an engraved label for their specimen and have their names mentioned in the January Newsletter. The Best of Show winners will also receive engraved plaques and a Club sweat shirt with the year embossed. The plaques are theirs to keep and display until next year's contest when new winners will be chosen and will keep the plaques until the next contest. This allows a history of winners to develop as the years go by. It is your chance to see the best of this past year and hear the stories behind the finds or creations.

These Awards were set up and started December 1995 by Vince Valade. In 2006, categories 9, cabochon and 10, Jewelry were refined. Starting in 2007 a new category 4, Micromount and category 7 and 8, redefining Best Faceted was added as well as all winners are to receive an engraved label. At the November 2007 Club meeting the contest was voted to be known as the "Vincent L. Valade Field Collecting & Creative Lapidary Awards".
