ALDEN, NEW YORK "SPRING CREEK FOSSIL LOCATION"

Sept. 9-11, 2011

Talk about eager! All the Capital Mineral and Gem Club members, who were going on this trip, arrived early at the staging area on 1-89. Only 3 cars made up the caravan. Some ten people had dropped out, perhaps because of the dreary weather forecast that happily didn't materialize).

Bill Brown was our very able trip leader. We were constantly impressed by his attention to the details that made the trip seamless and fun. He had called ahead to check on the motel, the weather, and the site itself.

New members on the trip were Kerry and Jim Reynolds and Martha and Brian Martel. Old timers were Pam and Gordon Jackson, and Bill Brown, and old, old-timer, Pat Barker.

Route 9 in Vermont and Route 90 in Massachusetts and New York ran through hurricane-ravished areas. It was especially sad to see grey coated cornfields and homes with all the contents outside drying off. The Mohawk River area (including Herkimer) was especially hard hit.

For lunch we stopped at a highway rest area. To our surprised it was closed because of the storms, except for "Roy Rogers" that was offering a very limited menu.

We reached our motel, an EconoLodge in Corfu, N.Y. at 5:00 p.m. In 15 minutes we had unloaded our non-collecting things and had taken off for Spring Creek in Alden. We had about a 15-minute hike from the car park. On the way Bill pointed to a smooth bark-free log spanning the creek. "We will be crossing here," he said with a straight face. For several horrified seconds, I believed him! Happily we carried on a little way further until we reached a very impressive cliff of layered dark slate. This is the Ledyard Shale in the Ludlowville Formation.

For two hour the boys dug out the loose material at the base of the cliffs. Bill told us that the best collecting would be here at the bottom of the cliffs. The ladies collected in the shoveled debris, and with glee soon were finding fossil Brachiopods! In better light we could see hints of pyritization (Some references say the golden metal is marcasite).

At dark we abandoned the search, very anxious to return, first thing the next morning.

At 6:00 a.m. we all met in the motel dining area for a rather sketchy but adequate free breakfast. We purchased Subway sandwiches to keep our strength up during the day.

By 8:00 we were back at Spring Creek. I soon found that I was not powerful enough to be able to chisel into the critical 15" to 18" zone, but I found some shell fossils in the shale on the floor that was easy to pry up. My colleagues tossed me several specimens, which were much appreciated.

The Martels worked as a team with Brian chiseling and digging while Martha was running a sieving operation. Soon they had filled an egg crate with tiny brachs, and a pail of bigger fossils. The Reynolds, Jacksons, and Bill worked diligently and were rewarded with many clay-covered fossils. Some fossils found here are Devonian: gastropods, cephalopods, pelecypods, brachiopods, and plant fossils. It will be interesting to see how many were found that day.

Of added interest were layers in the cliffs dotted occasionally with boulders (actually mud-balls) marking flash floods. These concretions are septarian nodules containing white and pink calcite, or even more attractive sparkling black crystallized calcite. The boys cracked open several and the ladies appropriated them for garden rocks. Needless to say, we had heavy loads on the hike back to the cars.

After much needed showers, we gathered at a nearby restaurant situated on a landmark waterfall. On the way back to the motel we were treated to a half hour of fireworks, launched from a local amusement park. We were all pretty tired after all the manual labor, and wasted no time getting to bed.

Next morning we had breakfast at the Denny's just across the street from the motel; an excellent meal. Bill gave us some hints on how to clean our finds. The instructions to soak them for a week were not popular advice, as I wanted to see my treasures right off!

We said our goodbyes as some of the group was going to stop in Herkimer to visit one of the "Diamond" locations. Our trip home was uneventful. Mileage to the Jackson's was 473 miles, and I had some 40 miles more to go.

A special thanks to Pam and Gordon for their transportation and very pleasant company. Many thanks to Bill for finding the excellent and reasonable motel and for arranging this extraordinarily successful field trip!

Rock Hounds Guide to NY State

An Exposition-Banner Book NY 1967

382. *Alden Spring Creek*. Off Route 20, north on Route 1 239. Take first road to right after crossing Spring Creek; this Department of Works road will lead to fenced-in plant. Leave car on grass off road. Creek is on right. Follow it about a thousand feet, pass the first shale bank on the right. Around the bend will be a bank twenty to thirty feet high. This weathered shale is easy to climb and dig into. Fossils, concretions, small crystals, seventy plants, fish teeth, crustaceans, sponges, gastropods, cephalopods, pelecypods, brachiopods. Dig anywhere to find a fossil. Farther upstream are more banks. The problem is to find the Ledyard seam. Concretions other than marcasite can be found. Also trilobites. Don't go in after or during a rain; everything will look black.
