Research on Lapis Lazuli

I checked with the local library to see what they had on lapis, their reference section only had a couple books and I borrowed one which had a number of pictures showing the use of lapis and I will bring the book to our next meeting if anyone is interested in seeing them.

I also went on the internet searching for lapis and there is so much there. It is easy to locate information by just typing in lapis or lapis lazuli in the search box and you will find some interesting web sites. Some of the information I located was very interesting and here is some of the highlights:

The finest color is an intense blue, lightly dusted with small flecks of golden pyrite. Often inferior lapis is dyed to improve its color, but they are often a very dark blue with a noticeable grey cast.

The finest lapis comes from the Badakshan area of Afghanistan. Shortugai, an Indus Valley civilization site on the Oxus river in northern Afghanistan was a mining centre for lapis lazuli. This source of lapis may be the oldest continually worked set of mines in the world, the same mines operating today having supplied the lapis of the pharaohs and the ancient Sumerians.

In the 1980's during the conflict with USSR the Afghanistan resistance fighters disassembled unexploded Soviet landmines and ordnance and used the explosives to help mine the lapis.

Lapis takes an excellent polish and has been used in jewelry, carvings, boxes, mosaics, other ornaments as well as vases. In architecture it has been used for cladding the walls and columns of palaces and churches.

When lapis is ground into powder it was mixed with oils and used to paint pictures on walls as well as decorative elements on furniture. The powdered lapis was also used by Egyptian ladies as a cosmetic eye shadow. It was also used to make ultramarine tempera paint and oil paint. It is no longer used in paint since a chemically identical synthetic variety became available.

In ancient Egypt lapis lazuli was a favorite stone for amulets and ornaments and Egyptian burial sites dating before 3000 B.C. contained thousands of jewelry items.

In addition to the Afghan deposits lapis has been found in the Andes near Ovalle, Chile, where it is usually pale, not a deep blue. Other sources are the Lake Baikal region of Russia, Siberia, Angola, Burma, Pakistan, California and Colorado in the US, as well as deposits in Canada and India.

The above is just a small sample of the information I found. I hope you will go searching to find your own bits of interesting information.

New Display Cases Proposal

Bob Whitmore and Donald Dallaire saw some display cases in Tucson that would replace the large cases we have now that are too big and on their last legs. The cases are made of aluminum and glass and break down easily. They fit into a carrying case about 4 inches thick, 35 inches wide and 24 inches high. The carrying cases have a handle and the edges are reinforced with aluminum. The display case and its storage case weigh approximately 65 lbs. Six of these would fit in approximately the same space as one of our large cases.

The company that manufactures and sells these cases is Arizona Case. They have a web site at www.arizonacase.com. The model we are recommending is #233 which has one glass shelf that is adjustable. The case measures 34" wide, 22" deep and 16" high. We are also suggesting that we get two LED lighting strips with each case that have 2 different temperature LED's giving a very good light to view minerals (just one temperature LED would either give you a light with more yellow tones or the other is very stark white). The cases also have a unique locking system with what is called a jewelry case lock which would make them very secure.

For 6 cases, 6 carrying cases, 12 LED lighting strips and shipping charges the whole cost would be approximately \$8,000. We are recommending the purchase of these 6 cases. No other reasonable proposal has come forward and if we try to have cases made they would not cost much less in our opinion and they likely would not be as durable.

Please come to the meeting prepared to discuss the clubs purchase of these cases, the membership could vote on the purchase in April this would insure that we have the new cases for this years show. Don Dallaire stated as treasurer we do have sufficient funds for this purchase without any adverse effect to the club funds. As treasurer I would recommend purchases such as this that benefit the club and will be a long term asset for our show and educational mission of the club.
